Antigen Testing Slated March 21

Comparative antigen testing will be conducted on March 21 to determine the true tuberculin status of those students who have been borderline reactors to the tuberculin testing given in school.

This study will involve approximately 85 students in the 11th and 12th grades, whose past records show consistent borderline reactions, and those 10th graders found to be 1+, 2+ and 3+reactors in the 10th grade testing program scheduled for March 7.

Since 1956, the Department of Health and the Hawaii Tuberculosis and Health Association have conducted tuberculin testing in schools throughout the island of Hawaii.




