A Request from the Cafeteria

Dear Students:

Inasmuch as Baked Beans (which is not one of our most popular dishes) have been on our school lunch menu weekly, we would like to explain why we have this dish so often.

Recently, a total of 2,500 pounds of dry white beans were donated to our cafeteria by the government as a Federal commodity. Not only beans but more palatable items such as turkeys, chickens and boneless roasts are also donated from time to time by the Federal government.

The school lunch managers, in receiving Federal commodities, can not be selective about these donations. Therefore, every school is obligated to utilize all donated items-the delicious ones as well as such items as beans.

We are now able to serve your favorite dishes, such as fried chicken, baked ham and roast beef (all purchased), once a week because of the abundance of donated commodities that we have minute of her two years here. received from the Federal government this year.

The following food items have been received thus far: dry white beans, canned green beans, flour, dry milk, rice, butter, frozen orange juice, boneless roasts, peanut butter, chicken, turkey, honey, canned purple plums, solid pack tomatoes, pineapple tidbits, grapefruit, rolled wheat, rolled oats, sliced peaches, bulgur, commeal, cheese, lard, canned beef, canned pork, chopped meat, raisins, dehydrated sweet potatoes.

At this time, may we ask you for your cooperation and continued support of our school lunch program?





It may be to your advantage to know just what to expect in military life, in particular, the Army, the most "popular" of the

For a quick preview of the Army, a 1965 HHS graduate, Sgt. Alfred Villanueva, who is stationed at Fort Gordon, Ga., has sent in the following:

- 1. Basic training: This eight-week period consists of, among Yagi; favors—Sandra Kumiji; other things, training, learning to shoot, going through ceremony (drilling with weapon), and intensive first aid and drills.
- 2. The Drill Sergeant: Much has been said of this "vile character" in movies, comics (Beetle Bailey's Sgt. As Alfred said, "One small mistake on the battlefield could send the whole squad to the slaughterhouse."

- 4. Army food: "Chow is pretty good, but some day it's not worth going over to the mess hall. However, on special occasions the meal is served with all the extras."
- 5. K.P. duty: What immediately comes to mind is an enlisted man glumly peeling potatoes. Fortunately for today's soldier, automation has infiltrated the Army and machines now perform this tedious task at most of the posts. But there are some posts which still have the "manually operated potato peeler."

Once a boy enters the Army, he is no longer a civilian and no longer master of himself. He is now a soldier who, when commanded, must "jump". So, boys, be prepared for a rugged and demanding life!



George ran a 4:23.4 mile to take first place laurels well ahead of any competitor.


